



Athlete Protection Program Overview

ATHLETE PROTECTION

The United States Olympic & Paralympic Committee (USOPC) officially certified USA Football as the National Governing Body (NGB) for American football. This distinction marks a significant milestone as USA Football becomes the first NGB for the sport and the only organization to select, train, and lead the U.S. National Teams, including for the upcoming Olympic Games.

This role in the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Movement brings new responsibilities that reinforce USA Football's commitment to providing athletes with a healthy and positive environment, particularly by protecting them from abuse in compliance with the USOPC and the U.S. Center for SafeSport.

U.S. CENTER FOR SAFESPORT CODE

The U.S. Center for SafeSport code establishes consistent standards for responding to and resolving abuse and misconduct in the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Movement.

As a Member, United States Olympic & Paralympic Committee, USA Football complies with the policies and procedures as defined by the U.S. Center for SafeSport code. The U.S. Center for SafeSport policies and procedures are among the strongest safeguards against athlete abuse that organizations serving athletes can adhere to.

RULES FOR REPORTING ABUSE

According to federal law, all adults who are authorized to interact with athletes are required to report any suspected incidents of abuse, including sexual abuse. If you learn any information that raises suspicion of abuse, you must report it to law enforcement or your state's designated agency within 24 hours. It is the responsibility of USA Football and every adult participant to promptly report any incidents of abuse or sexual misconduct involving a USA Football athlete.

Reporting must occur promptly when someone has firsthand knowledge of misconduct or has received specific and credible information from a victim or an informed third party. Additionally, various state laws may require that reports be made to law enforcement or to a designated child protection agency. No USA Football adult participant shall retaliate against anyone who has made a report in good faith. False reporting of sexual misconduct, made with malicious intent, is prohibited. Additionally, there are no civil or criminal statutes of limitations that apply to reports of sexual abuse cases.

REPORTING AN ISSUE

The U.S. Center for SafeSport has exclusive jurisdiction for all issues dealing with:

- Sexual Misconduct
- Sexual Harassment
- Sexually Explicit/Inappropriate Communication through Social Media

REQUIREMENTS AND CATEGORIES

USA Football is working with the U.S. Center for SafeSport and the USOPC to provide updated training and resources for adult participants who have a role in the Olympic Movement.

ADULT PARTICIPANT CATEGORIES

An Adult Participant is any adult (18 years of age or older) authorized, approved or appointed by USA Football to have regular contact¹ or authority over Minor Athletes. This definition applies to all Adult Participants² who are included in one or more of the following categories:

- USA Football Board of Directors
- USA Football Committees and Councils
- USA Football Staff
- USA Football Volunteers
- USA Football Contracted Staff
- USA Football Medical Providers³
- USA Football National Team/National Team Development Program Athletes
- USA Football National Team/National Team Development Program Coaches
- USA Football Members
- USA Football License Holders
- Local Affiliated Organization Board of Directors
- Local Affiliated Organization Staff
- Local Affiliated Organization Members
- Local Affiliated Organization License Holders
- Local Affiliated Organization Athletes
- Local Affiliated Organization Coaches

¹Regular Contact: Ongoing interactions within a 12-month period wherein an Adult Participant is in a role of direct and active engagement with any Minor Athlete.

²This may include volunteers, medical staff, trainers, chaperones, monitors, contract personnel, bus/van drivers, officials, adult athletes, staff, board members, and any other individual who meets the Adult Participant definition.

³Adult Participants, who are medical providers, required to take training under the U.S. Center for SafeSport Minor Athlete Abuse Prevention Policies can take the Health Professionals Course in lieu of the SafeSport Trained Core Course.

ADULT PARTICIPANT REQUIREMENTS

While USA Football has offered abuse prevention training in the past, as an adult participant, you will be required to complete new training to help keep athletes safe within USA Football's role in the Olympic Movement. Requirements will include, but are not limited to:

- Abide by the USA Football MAAPP policy
- Following guidelines for one-on-one interactions with minor athletes
- Completing training and education through the U.S. Center for SafeSport
- Participating in monitoring, supervision and mandatory reporting
- Adhering to additional required policies and best practice guidelines
- Starting in 2026: USOPC Approved Background Check for Select Individuals

These new requirements will help USA Football adult participants to:

- Recognize and learn about risks and red-flag behavior
- Respond and take necessary actions when an incident occurs
- Support Recovery to empower survivors with resources to aid with healing

After approval from the U.S. Center for SafeSport, USA Football will share the updated MAAPP, along with training links and resources.
